1. Adoption of Financial Statements.
 - a. The Audited Standalone Financial Statements of the Company for the Financial Year ended as on March 31, 2025, together with the Reports of the Board of Directors ("the Board") and the Auditors thereon; and
 - b. The Audited Consolidated Financial Statements of the Company for the Financial Year ended as on March 31, 2025, together with the Report of the Auditors thereon.
2. To appoint Director in place of Ms. Swati Sahukara (DIN: 06801137), who retires by rotation and being eligible, offers herself for re-appointment.

SPECIAL BUSINESS:

3. **To appoint M/s Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries as Secretarial Auditors of the Company:**

To consider and, if thought fit, to pass the following resolution as an Ordinary Resolution:

"RESOLVED THAT pursuant to Section 204 and other applicable provisions, if any, of the Companies Act, 2013, Rule 9 of the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014 and Regulation 24A of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations"), other applicable laws/statutory provisions, if any, as amended from time to time, M/s Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries (FRN: S2020MH721600) be and are hereby appointed as Secretarial Auditors of the Company for the first term of five consecutive years commencing from financial year 2025-26 till financial year 2029-30, to conduct Secretarial Audit of the Company and to furnish the Secretarial Audit Report.

4. Approval under Section 180(1)(a) of the Companies Act, 2013 for Sale, Lease, or Disposal of Undertakings

To consider and if thought fit, to pass with or without modification(s), the following resolution as Special Resolution:

"RESOLVED THAT pursuant to the provisions of Section 180(1)(a) and other applicable provisions, if any, of the Companies Act, 2013, read with applicable rules made thereunder (including any statutory modification(s) or re-enactment(s) thereof for the time being in force), and subject to the approval of shareholders of the Company, consent of the Members of the Company be and is hereby accorded to sell, lease, transfer, mortgage, charge or otherwise dispose of, by way of one or more transactions, the whole or substantially the whole of the undertaking(s) or any part thereof or to create charge, mortgage or hypothecation on the movable and/or immovable properties of the Company, both present and future, in favour of any lender(s), financial institution(s), bank(s), or any other person(s), to secure borrowings or other obligations of the Company, for an amount not exceeding ₹100 crore (Rupees One Hundred Crore only).

RESOLVED FURTHER THAT such transactions shall be in the best interest of the Company and necessary for its business operations, and the Board shall ensure that they are carried out in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

RESOLVED FURTHER THAT any of the Director of the Company be and is hereby authorized to do all such acts, deeds, matters and things as may be necessary, proper or expedient to give effect to this resolution."

5. To increase limit to borrow funds pursuant to the provisions of section 180(1) (c) of the Companies Act, 2013

To consider and if thought fit, to pass with or without modification(s), the following resolution as Special Resolution:

"RESOLVED THAT in supersession of all the earlier resolutions passed in this regard and pursuant to Section 180(1)(c) of the Companies Act, 2013 and rules framed there under (including any statutory modification(s) or re-enactment thereof, for the time being in force) and any other applicable laws and provisions of Articles of Association of the Company, consent of the members of the Company be and is hereby accorded to the Board of Directors of the Company (the "Board") to borrow such amount, from time to time, at its discretion, with or without security, and upon such terms and conditions as the Board may think fit, for the purpose of business of the Company, such that the amount to be borrowed together with the amount already borrowed by the Company (apart from the temporary loans obtained from the Company's bankers in the ordinary course of business) and outstanding at any point of time shall not exceed ₹100 crore (Rupees Hundred Crores Only);

RESOLVED FURTHER THAT any of the Director of the Company, be and is hereby authorized to do all acts and take all such steps as may be necessary, proper or expedient to give effect to this resolution.”

6. To make investments, give loans, guarantees and security in excess of limits specified under section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013:

“RESOLVED THAT in supersession of all the earlier resolutions passed in this regard and pursuant to the provisions of Section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Meetings of Board and its Powers) Rules, 2014 and other applicable provisions, if any, of the Companies Act 2013, (including any statutory modification or re-enactment thereof for the time being in force), and the rules framed thereunder the consent of the members on the Company be and is hereby accorded to the Board of Directors to, inter alia, give any loan to any person(s) or other body corporate(s); give any guarantee or provide security in connection with a loan to any person(s) or other body corporate(s); and acquire by way of subscription, purchase or otherwise, securities of any other body corporate from time to time in one or more tranches as the Board of Directors as in their absolute discretion deem beneficial and in the interest of the Company however, that the aggregate of the loans and investments so far made, the amount for which guarantees or securities so far provided to or in all other body corporate along with the investments, loans, guarantees or securities proposed to be made or given by the Company, from time to time, shall not exceed, at any time ₹100 crore (Rupees Hundred Crores Only) over and above the limit of sixty per cent of the paid-up share capital, free reserves and securities premium account of the Company or one hundred per cent of free reserves and securities premium account of the Company, whichever is more.

aggregate value not exceeding ₹100 crore (Rupees One Hundred Crore only) during the financial year 2025-26, in the ordinary course of business and on an arm's length basis.

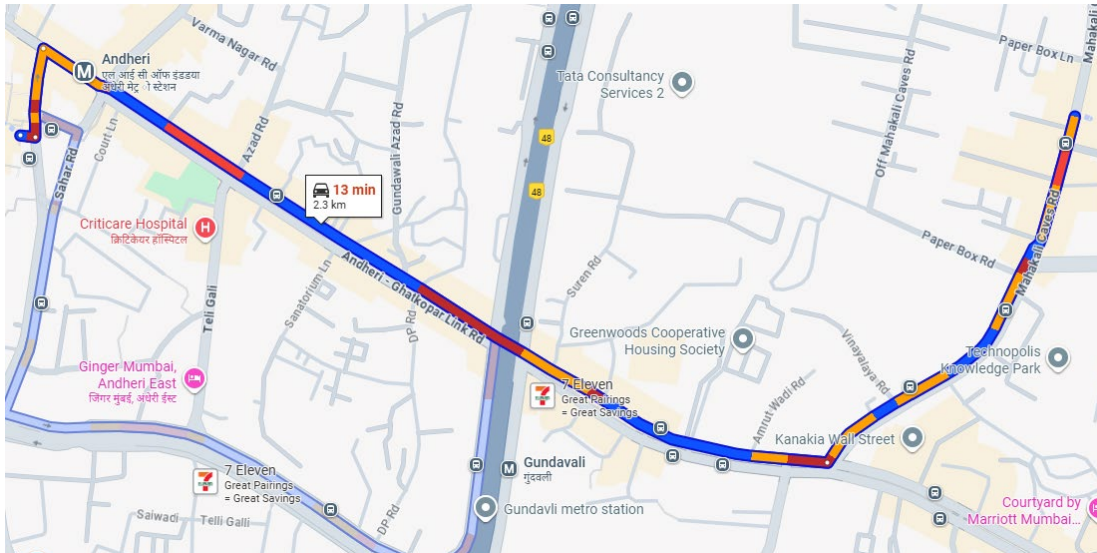
1. A MEMBER ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE MEETING IS ENTITLED TO APPOINT A PROXY TO ATTEND AND VOTE ON POLL ON HIS/HER BEHALF AND THE PROXY NEED NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY. The instrument of Proxy, in order to be effective, should be deposited at the Registered Office of the Company, duly completed and signed, not later than 48 (forty-eight) hours before the commencement of the Meeting. Proxy Form is annexed to this Annual Report. A proxy so appointed shall not have any right to speak at the Meeting. A person can act as a Proxy on behalf of not more than 50 (Fifty) Shareholders and holding in aggregate, not more than 10% (ten percent) of the total share capital of the Company. Shareholders holding more than 10% (ten percent) of the total share capital of the Company may appoint a single person as Proxy, who shall not act as a Proxy for any other Shareholder. Proxies submitted on behalf of limited companies, societies, partnership firms, etc. must be supported by appropriate resolution/authority, as applicable, issued by the member organization. Corporate Shareholders intending to send their Authorized Representative(s) to attend the , pursuant to Section 113 of the Act, are requested to send to the Company, a certified true copy of the Board Resolution together with the respective specimen signatures of those Representative(s) authorized under the said resolution to attend and vote on their behalf at the Meeting. In case of joint holders attending the Meeting, only such joint holder who is higher in the order of names will be entitled to vote.
2. During the period beginning 24 (twenty-four) hours before the time fixed for the commencement of the AGM and ending with the conclusion of the AGM, a Shareholder would be entitled to inspect the Proxies lodged, at any time during the business hours of the Company, provided that not less than three days of notice in writing is given to the Company.
3. Pursuant to Rule 18(3) of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, you are requested to provide your email – id to facilitate easy and faster dispatch of Notices of the general meetings and other communications by electronic mode from time to time.
4. The register of Members and the share transfer books shall remain closed from **September 24, 2025, to September 30, 2025** both days inclusive for the purpose of AGM.
5. Pursuant to Section 101 and Section 136 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with relevant Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 and Regulation of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, companies can serve Annual Reports and other communications through electronic mode to those members who have registered their e-mail address either with the Company. Members who have not registered their e-mail addresses, so far, are requested to register their e-mail addresses with the company along with details like Name, Folio No. etc.
6. Members/ Proxy Holders are requested to bring the duly completed and signed Attendance Slip along with their copy of Annual Report to the Meeting. In order to enable us to register your attendance at the venue of the Annual General Meeting, please bring folio number to enable us to provide a duly filled attendance slip for your signature and participation at the meeting.
7. The Explanatory Statement, pursuant to Section 102 of the Companies Act, 2013 setting out facts concerning the business of the Notice is annexed hereto, wherever required.
8. All documents referred to in the Notice will be available for inspection at the Company's registered office during normal business hours on working days up

- to date of the AGM.
9. Any query relating to accounts or any other items of business set out in the Agenda of the meeting must be sent to the Company's Registered Office at least seven days before the date of the Meeting.
 10. The Securities and Exchange Board of India has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in the securities market. Members are, therefore, requested to submit the PAN to the Company.
 11. Members who hold shares in physical form in multiple folios in identical names or joint holding in the same order of names are requested to send the share certificates to the Company for consolidation into a single folio.
 12. Members are requested to:
 - exercise due diligence and notify the Company of any change in address or demise of any member on immediate basis or if situation warrants; as soon as possible.
 - Communicate on all matters pertaining to their shareholdings with the Company, quoting their respective Ledger Folio Numbers, copy of pan etc.
 13. Additional information, pursuant to Regulation 36(3) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 in respect of the directors seeking appointment/ reappointment at the AGM, is furnished as annexure to the Notice. The directors have furnished consent/declaration for their appointment/ reappointment as required under the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules there under.
 14. Voting rights shall be reckoned on the paid-up value of shares registered in the name of the member / beneficial owner (in case of electronic shareholding) as on the cut-off date **September 23, 2025**.
 15. A person whose name is recorded in the register of members maintained by the company as on the cut-off date, only shall be entitled to attend as well as voting in the meeting.
 16. The Board of Directors of the Company has appointed **CS Nitesh Chaudhary**, Proprietor of M/s. Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries, Indore as Scrutinizer to scrutinize the voting by poll at the AGM venue in a fair and transparent manner and he has communicated his willingness to be appointed and will be available for same purpose.
 17. The Scrutinizer shall, after the conclusion of the AGM, count the votes cast at the meeting in the presence of at least two (2) witnesses not in the employment of the Company. The Scrutinizer shall, within a period of not later than 48 hours of conclusion of the AGM, prepare a consolidated Scrutinizer's Report of the total votes cast in favour or against, if any, and submit it to the Chairman or any person authorized by him in writing, who shall countersign the same and declare the results of the voting. Based on the scrutinizer's report, the Company will submit within 2 (two) working days of the conclusion of the AGM to the Stock Exchanges, details of the voting results as required under Regulation 44(3) of the SEBI Listing Regulations. The Resolutions shall be deemed to be passed on the date of the AGM subject to receipt of the requisite number of votes in favour of the Resolutions.

ANNEXURE TO NOTICE

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT PURSUANT TO SECTION 102 OF COMPANIES ACT, 2013

Item No.3:

The Board at its meeting held on September 03, 2025, based on recommendation of the Audit Committee, after evaluating and considering various factors such as industry experience, competency of the audit team, efficiency in conduct of audit, independence, etc., has approved the appointment of M/s. Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries, a peer reviewed firm (Firm Registration Number: S2020MH721600) as Secretarial Auditors of the Company for first term of five consecutive years commencing from FY 2025-26 till FY 2029-30, subject to approval of the Members.

The appointment of Secretarial Auditors shall be in terms of the amended Regulation 24A of the SEBI Listing Regulations vide SEBI Notification dated December 12, 2024 and provisions of Section 204 of the Act and Rule 9 of the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014.

M/s. Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries, is a well-known firm based in Indore. Renowned for its commitment to quality and precision, the firm has been Peer Reviewed and Quality Reviewed by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI), ensuring the highest standards in professional practices. It provides comprehensive professional services in Company Law, Company Secretarial Work, Due Diligence, SEBI Regulation, FEMA compliance, and other various allied fields, delivering strategic solutions to ensure regulatory adherence and operational efficiency. The recommendation for the appointment of M/s. Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates, Practicing Company Secretaries as the Secretarial Auditors is based on their proven expertise in corporate laws, strong track record in conducting secretarial audits across diverse industries, and their compliance-oriented approach. The firm possesses the requisite qualifications and experience under applicable laws, and has demonstrated a high standard of professional integrity and diligence in past assignments. Their appointment is expected to ensure accurate, independent, and comprehensive secretarial compliance reporting for the Company.

The terms and conditions of the appointment of M/s. Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates include a tenure of five (5) consecutive years, commencing from April 01, 2025 up to March 31, 2030 at a remuneration and other out-of-pocket costs as may be mutually agreed between the Board and the Secretarial Auditors. Additional fees for statutory certifications and other professional services will be determined separately by the management, in consultation with M/s. Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates, and will be subject to approval by the Board of Directors and/or the Audit Committee.

Accordingly, approval of the shareholders is sought for appointment of M/s. Nitesh Chaudhary & Associates as the Secretarial Auditors of the Company.

None of the Directors, Key Managerial Personnel (KMP), or their relatives are, in any way, concerned or interested, financially or otherwise, in the said Resolution.

The Board of Directors recommends the Ordinary Resolution, for approval by the Members, as set out at Item No. 3 of the Notice.

Item No.4:

The provisions of Section 180(1)(a) of the Companies Act, 2013 require that the Board of Directors shall not, except with the consent of the shareholders by way of a special resolution, sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of the whole or substantially the whole of the undertaking(s) of the Company or, where the Company owns more than one undertaking, of the whole or substantially the whole of any such undertaking.

Further, creation of charge, mortgage, or hypothecation on the Company's assets or undertakings in favour of lenders, financial institutions or other creditors, as security for borrowings or obligations of the Company, is also deemed as "otherwise disposing of" the undertaking and thus requires shareholders' approval under Section 180(1)(a), if such transaction exceeds the specified limits.

The Company, in the course of its business operations, may be required to create charge/mortgage/hypothecation on its assets, or otherwise dispose of or lease certain properties or undertakings, in favour of lenders or for other strategic purposes. The Board of Directors considers it necessary to obtain shareholders' approval to authorize such transactions up to an aggregate amount not exceeding ₹100 crore (Rupees One Hundred Crore only).

The proposed approval is in the best interests of the Company and its business requirements, and will provide flexibility to the Board to manage its assets and financial obligations effectively.

None of the Directors, Key Managerial Personnel or their relatives are concerned or interested in the proposed resolution, financially or otherwise.

The Board recommends the passing of the resolution as a Special Resolution.

Item No.5:

Keeping in view existing and future financial requirements to support its business operations, the Company may need additional funds. For this purpose, the Company may, from time to time, raise finance from various Banks and/ or financial Institutions and/ or any other lending institutions and/ or Bodies Corporate and/ or such other persons/ individuals as may be considered fit, which, together with the moneys already borrowed by the Company (apart from temporary loans obtained from the Company's bankers in ordinary course of business) may exceed the

aggregate of the paid-up capital and free reserves of the Company. Hence it is proposed to revise the maximum borrowing limits upto ₹100 crore (Rupees Hundred Crores Only) for the Company. Pursuant to Section 180 (1) (c) of the Companies Act, 2013, the Board of Directors cannot borrow more than the aggregate amount of the paid-up capital of the Company and its free reserves at any one time except with the consent of the members of the Company in a general meeting. In order to facilitate securing the borrowing made by the Company, it would be necessary to create charge on the assets or whole or part of the undertaking of the Company.

None of the Directors or Key Managerial Personnel of the Company and their relatives is concerned or interested, financially or otherwise, in the Special Resolution.

The Board of Directors of you Company recommends the same to the shareholders for passing of Special Resolution.

Item No.6:

As per Section 186 of the Act read with the Rules framed thereunder, the Company is required to obtain the prior approval of the Members by way of a Special Resolution for acquisition by way of subscription, purchase or otherwise, the securities of any other body corporate, granting of loans, advances and guarantees exceeding sixty per cent of its paid-up share capital, free reserves and securities premium account or one hundred percent of its free reserves and securities premium account, whichever is higher.

The current loans and investments of the Company is although well within the limits specified under the law, it was thought expedient by the Board that as a measure of achieving greater financial flexibility and to enable optimal financial structuring and to keep sufficient safeguard, the said limits specified under Section 186 be increased to ₹100 crore (Rupees Hundred Crores Only) with the approval of shareholders.

The approval of the members is being sought by way of a Special Resolution pursuant to Section 186 of the Act read with the Rules made thereunder, to enable the Company to acquire by way of subscription, purchase or otherwise, the securities of any other body corporate, exceeding sixty percent of its paid-up capital, free reserves and securities premium account or one hundred percent of its free reserves and securities premium account, whichever is higher.

None of the Directors, Key Managerial Personnel of the Company and their relatives are in any way concerned or interested in passing of resolution.

The Board of Directors of your Company recommends the same to the shareholders for passing of a Special Resolution.

Item No.7:

Regulation 23 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, inter alia, states that effective from April 1, 2022, all Material Related Party Transactions ('RPT') shall require prior approval of the shareholders by means of an Ordinary Resolution, even if such transaction(s) are in the ordinary course of business and at an arm's length pricing basis. A transaction with a Related Party shall be considered material, if the transaction(s) to be entered into individually or taken together with previous transactions during a financial year, exceeds ₹1,000 crore or 10% of the annual consolidated turnover of a listed entity as per the last audited financial statements of the listed entity, whichever is lower. Your directors have pleasure in presenting their 39th Annual Report on the business performance and operations of the Company **Crysdale Industries Limited** (Formerly known as **Relson India Limited**) along with the Audited Financial Statements for the financial year ended March 31, 2025 ('the Year' or 'FY 2025').

1. Financial summary or highlights/performance of the company:

The Company's performance during the financial year under review as compared to the previous financial year is summarized below:

During the financial year 2024-25, the Company generated revenue of ₹ 4,29,581 from its operations and earned ₹ 26,441 as other income. This marks a significant improvement compared to the previous financial year, during which no operational revenue was recorded. However, the Company incurred a net loss of ₹ 19,08,984 in FY 2024-25, as against a loss of ₹10,21,659 in the previous year.

During the financial year 2024-25, the consolidated revenue of ₹4,29,581 from operational activities and ₹26,441 as other income. As the Company did not have any operational revenue in the previous financial year, these figures mark the beginning of its business activities. The consolidated loss of ₹19,37,406 in the financial year 2024-25, as against no loss in the previous year.

The Audited Financial Statements of your Company as on March 31, 2025, are prepared in accordance with the relevant applicable Ind AS and Regulation 33 of the Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("SEBI Listing Regulations") and the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("Act").

2. Segment Performance:

The company's operations are integrated, and therefore, it does not present separate reportable segments.

3. Dividend:

In light of the current economic conditions and the company's cash requirements, the Board of Directors has chosen not to recommend a dividend for the financial year ending March 31, 2025.

4. Transfer to Reserves:

During the year, the Board has not transferred any amount to the Reserves of the Company.

5. Change in nature of business, if any:

During the financial year under review, there were no change(s) in the nature of the business carried out by the Company. The Company carried out the same business mentioned in the Memorandum of Association of the Company.

6. Subsidiary, Associate and Joint Venture Companies, their highlights of performance and their contribution to overall performance of the company:

'Wergreen Industries Private Limited' has become the subsidiary with effect from July 31, 2024 of the Company.

A report on the performance and financial position of subsidiaries of your Company including capital, reserves, total assets, total liabilities, details of investment, turnover, etc., pursuant to Section 129 of the Act is provided in **Form AOC-1 as "Annexure I"**, which forms an integral part of the Board's Report.

However, the Company has already applied for revocation of the suspension, submitting the required fees and necessary information to BSE.

The Company has changed its name from "Relson India Limited" to "Crysdale Industries Limited" approved by members in the Extra-Ordinary General Meeting held on April 04, 2024, by Registrar of Companies (ROC-Mumbai) on June 06, 2024 and by Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) on June 20, 2024.

Opinion

NOTES FORMING PARTS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENT AS AT MARCH 31, 2025

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES ON ACCOUNT

1. Corporate Information:

CRYSDALE INDUSTRIES LIMITED (Formerly Known as Relson India Limited) ('the **Company**') was incorporated in India on 6th January, 1987. The Equity Shares of the Company are listed in India on the **BSE Limited**.

2. Basis of accounting and preparation of financial statements

The Financial Statement of the Company have been prepared in accordance with India Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and relevant provision of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"). These are the Company's first Ind AS financial statement and Ind AS 101. 'First - time Adoption of Indian Accounting Standards have been applied. The policies set out below have been consistently applied during the year presented. For all periods up to and including the year ended 31st March, 2025, the Company's prepared its financial statement in accordance with the accounting standards notified under Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006 (as amended) and other relevant provision of the Act ("Previous GAAP").

All the assets and Liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the criteria set out in Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. The accounting policies, in all material respects, have been consistently applied by the Company and are consistent with those used in the previous year, except to the extent stated in 'Note - c' below.

a) Use of estimates

In preparing these Standalone financial statements, management has made judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Actual results may differ from those estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis and appropriate changes are made as management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Revisions to accounting estimates are reflected in the period in which such changes are made and if material, their effects are disclosed in the financial statements.

b) Cash and cash equivalents (for purposes of Cash Flow Statement)

Cash comprises cash on hand and demand deposits with banks. Cash equivalents are short-term balances (with an original maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

c) Cash flow statement

The Cash flow statement is prepared under the "indirect method" in accordance with Ind AS-7, whereby the profit / (loss) before extraordinary items and tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on the available information.

d) Revenue Recognition

Other Income

i. Interest Income

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis. Overdue interest is recognized as income on realization.

ii. Dividend Income

Dividend income is recognized on receipt basis i.e. it is accounted when the Company has received the same.

e) Fixed assets

i. Tangible Assets: Fixed assets, carried at cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. The cost of fixed assets includes interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying fixed assets up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use and other incidental expenses incurred up to that date. Fixed assets acquired and put to use for project purpose are capitalized and depreciation thereon is included in the project cost till commissioning of the project.

ii. Intangible Assets: Intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortization and impairment of the respective assets.

f) Depreciation and Amortization

The Company Depreciates its fixed assets on basis of "Written Down Value" over the useful life or residual value as in the manner prescribed in Part C of Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013, as against the earlier practice of depreciating at the rate prescribed in Schedule XIV of the Companies Act, 1956.

Depreciation on additions or disposals to the tangible assets during the year is provided on pro-rata basis from / till the date of such additions or disposals as the case may be.

g) Investments

Investments are classified as Long term and Current Investments.

Long-term investments (excluding investment properties), are carried individually at cost less provision for other than temporary diminution, if any, in the value of such investments.

Current investments are carried individually, at the lower of cost and fair value. Cost of investments includes acquisition charges such as brokerage, fees and duties.

The quoted and unquoted investments (shares) by the Company are held in physical form and have not been verified.

h) Quoted Investment

The management has given custody of all the shares certificates to depository authorities for completing the demating formalities and hence we are unable to conduct the physical verification of shares. Further some of the shares are in the name of directors and their relatives and yet not transferred in the name of the company.

i) Unquoted Investment

These share certificates are not available for verification, although allotment acknowledgement letter from respective companies were made available. The shares in respect of which market quotations are not available, disclosed under "Unquoted Investment".

j) Employee benefits

Employee benefits include provident fund, superannuation fund, gratuity fund, compensated absences, long service awards and post-employment medical benefits.

k) Segment Reporting

The Company identifies primary segments based on the dominant source, nature of risks and returns and the internal organisation and management structure. The operating

segments are the segments for which separate financial information is available and for which operating profit/loss amounts are evaluated regularly by the executive Management in deciding how to allocate resources and in assessing performance.

l) Earnings per share

Basic EPS is computed by dividing the net profit for the year attributable to the Equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. Diluted EPS is computed by dividing the net profit for the year, adjusted for the effects of dilutive potential equity shares, attributable to the equity shareholders by weighted average number of equity shares and dilutive potential equity shares outstanding during the year – end, except where the results would be anti-dilutive.

m) Taxes on income

Current tax is the amount of tax payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

Deferred tax is recognized on timing differences, being the differences between the taxable income and the accounting income that originate in one period and are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and the tax laws enacted or substantially enacted as at the reporting date. Deferred tax assets are recognized for timing differences of other items only to the extent that reasonable certainty exists that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which these can be realized.

n) Provisions, Contingent liabilities and Contingent Assets

A provision is recognized when the Company has a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made.

Provisions (excluding retirement benefits) are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on the best estimate required to settle the obligation at the Balance Sheet date. These are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

A disclosure for Contingent Liability is made when there is a possible obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

3. Changes in Accounting Policies

Depreciation of Fixed Assets: The Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 is being implemented from 1st April, 2014 and the Company has adopted “Written down value” method of Depreciation on its Fixed Asset as provided in Part C of Schedule II.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Crysdale Industries Limited (Formerly Known as Relson India Limited) (the Parent) and its subsidiary, (the Parent and its subsidiary together referred to as "the Group") which includes the Group's share of profit in its subsidiary, which comprise the Consolidated Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2025, and the Consolidated Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows and the Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity for the year ended on that date, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Accordingly, we are unable to conclude whether or not the other information is materially misstated with respect to this matter.

The Parent Company board of directors are responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these Ind AS Consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance, including other comprehensive Income, changes in equity and cash flows of the Group in accordance with the Ind AS and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting standards specified under section 133 of the Act. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES ON ACCOUNT

1. Corporate Information:

CRYSDALE INDUSTRIES LIMITED ('the Company') was incorporated in India on 6th January, 1987. The Equity Shares of the Company are listed in India on the **BSE Limited**.

2. Basis of accounting and preparation of financial statements

The Financial Statement of the Company have been prepared in accordance with India Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") notified under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and relevant provision of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"). These are the Company's first Ind AS financial statement and Ind AS 101. 'First - time Adoption of Indian Accounting Standards have been applied. The policies set out below have been consistently applied during the year presented. For all periods up to and including the year ended 31st March, 2025, the Company's prepared its financial statement in accordance with the accounting standards notified under Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006 (as amended) and other relevant provision of the Act ("Previous GAAP").

All the assets and Liabilities have been classified as current or non-current as per the criteria set out in Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013. The accounting policies, in all material respects, have been consistently applied by the Company and are consistent with those used in the previous year, except to the extent stated in 'Note - c' below.

a) Use of estimates

In preparing these Standalone financial statements, management has made judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Actual results may differ from those estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis and appropriate changes are made as management becomes aware of changes in circumstances surrounding the estimates. Revisions to accounting estimates are reflected in the period in which such changes are made and if material, their effects are disclosed in the financial statements.

b) Cash and cash equivalents (for purposes of Cash Flow Statement)

Cash comprises cash on hand and demand deposits with banks. Cash equivalents are short-term balances (with an original maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition), highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

c) Cash flow statement

The Cash flow statement is prepared under the "indirect method" in accordance with Ind AS-7, whereby the profit / (loss) before extraordinary items and tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated based on the available information.

d) Revenue Recognition

Other Income

i. Interest Income

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis. Overdue interest is recognized as income on realization.

ii. Dividend Income

Dividend income is recognized on receipt basis i.e. it is accounted when the Company has received the same.

e) Fixed assets

i. Tangible Assets: Fixed assets, carried at cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. The cost of fixed assets includes interest on borrowings attributable to acquisition of qualifying fixed assets up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use and other incidental expenses incurred up to that date. Fixed assets acquired and put to use for project purpose are capitalized and depreciation thereon is included in the project cost till commissioning of the project.

ii. Intangible Assets: Intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortization and impairment of the respective assets.

f) Depreciation and Amortization

The Company Depreciates its fixed assets on basis of "Written Down Value" over the useful life or residual value as in the manner prescribed in Part C of Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013, as against the earlier practice of depreciating at the rate prescribed in Schedule XIV of the Companies Act, 1956.

Depreciation on additions or disposals to the tangible assets during the year is provided on pro-rata basis from / till the date of such additions or disposals as the case may be.

g) Investments

Investments are classified as Long term and Current Investments.

Long-term investments (excluding investment properties), are carried individually at cost less provision for other than temporary diminution, if any, in the value of such investments.

Current investments are carried individually, at the lower of cost and fair value. Cost of investments includes acquisition charges such as brokerage, fees and duties.

The quoted and unquoted investments (shares) by the Company are held in physical form and have not been verified.

h) Quoted Investment

The management has given custody of all the shares certificates to depository authorities for completing the demitting formalities and hence we are unable to conduct the physical verification of shares. Further some of the shares are in the name of directors and their relatives and yet not transferred in the name of the company.

i) Unquoted Investment

These share certificates are not available for verification, although allotment acknowledgement letter from respective companies were made available. The shares in respect of which market quotations are not available, disclosed under "Unquoted Investment".

j) Employee benefits

Employee benefits include provident fund, superannuation fund, gratuity fund, compensated absences, long service awards and post-employment medical benefits.

k) Segment Reporting

The Company identifies primary segments based on the dominant source, nature of risks and returns and the internal organisation and management structure. The operating segments are the segments for which separate

financial information is available and for which operating profit/loss amounts are evaluated regularly by the executive Management in deciding how to allocate resources and in assessing performance.

l) Earnings per share

Basic EPS is computed by dividing the net profit for the year attributable to the Equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the period. Diluted EPS is computed by dividing the net profit for the year, adjusted for the effects of dilutive potential equity shares, attributable to the equity shareholders by weighted average number of equity shares and dilutive potential equity shares outstanding during the year – end, except where the results would be anti dilutive.

m) Taxes on income

Current tax is the amount of tax payable on the taxable income for the year as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

Deferred tax is recognized on timing differences, being the differences between the taxable income and the accounting income that originate in one period and are capable of reversal in one or more subsequent periods. Deferred tax is measured using the tax rates and the tax laws enacted or substantially enacted as at the reporting date. Deferred tax assets are recognized for timing differences of other items only to the extent that reasonable certainty exists that sufficient future taxable income will be available against which these can be realized.

n) Provisions, Contingent liabilities and Contingent Assets

A provision is recognized when the Company has a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made.

Provisions (excluding retirement benefits) are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on the best estimate required to settle the obligation at the Balance Sheet date. These are reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

A disclosure for Contingent Liability is made when there is a possible obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

3. Changes in Accounting Policies

Depreciation of Fixed Assets: The Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 is being implemented from 1st April, 2014 and the Company has adopted “Written down value” method of Depreciation on its Fixed Asset as provided in Part C of Schedule II.
